Sustanablity

Though far from perfect, the Whole Earth Festival champions its commitment to becoming ever-more sustainable with each year of its evolution. In its 55 years of existence, WEF has transitioned to offering exclusively vegetarian food options, employing a peaceful army of compost-sorting volunteers, incorporating a reusable dish program that outsiders can only describe as absurd before seeing its function, and utilizing solar power. We hope to earn our status as zero-waste, evermore incorporating creative methods of waste reduction.

Community

Whether it be a shared music taste or matching grime beneath one's nails from sorting compost, the Whole Earth Festival proudly fosters an environment in which students, community members, and strangers alike can congregate and forge genuine relationships. The orchestration of a festival takes innumerable hands and hearts working together to achieve a common goal; community is therefore the "Whole" to our "Earth Festival."

Expression

At the Whole Earth Festival, community is everything. We put the well-being and inclusion of every attendee, volunteer, and staff member first, creating a warm and welcoming atmosphere. We're all about embracing diverse forms of creativity while respecting cultural integrity. As a festival family, we stick to our roots while always staying open to growth and change.

NonViolence

Non-violence is an integral and historic part of the Whole Earth Festival. From understanding the practice of de-escalation to active listening, we encourage and strive to make this festival a welcoming and diverse experience for all people. Whole Earth rejects the dominant mindset in American culture: an end to contention results in the dichotomy of victor and vanquished. Nonviolent conflict resolution is rooted in awareness and peaceful action, making it a powerful practice we employ not only in our festival, but lingers amidst our conscious and subconscious minds, long after the dome's deconstruction.

Zero Waste

At this festival we recycle, compost, or reuse everything we possibly can to achieve "Zero Waste". With the help of our compost and recycling directors and their wonderful volunteers all disposed materials are hand sorted to see that they are properly recycled or composted. WERC (Whole Earth Reusable Cooperative) aims at keeping the festival free of disposable single use dishes and utensils by providing reusable dishware. This reduces our contribution to landfills, saves forests, prevents land/air/water pollution, and saves on energy costs. Make sure you return your dishes to the dish return booths so they can be cleaned and used again and again!

Complete Without Meat

Have you noticed that none of the food booths offer meat?
A long time ago the festival staff decided that this event would be meat free, for the sake of you and I and the animals and the Whole Earth! Eating plant based is the number one way an individual can reduce their impact on the environment, it's also better for your health. Let's skip the factory farms and eat plants!

Love Your Mother

It's no coincidence that this festival is always held on Mothers Day weekend. Whole Earth is a celebration of the life that is given to us by our mothers; especially our Great Mother: Mother Earth. Thank you Mother Earth for every leaf on every tree, for the setting and rising sun, for the blue of the sky and green of the grass, for every ripple in every water, every star among the moon, for every every creature small and big, and most of all thank you for the gift of being. Mothers, you are the catalyst of life, what would we do without you!

Whole Earth Meditation

Visualize yourself right where you are. Notice the space that you are in, whether it be inside or outside. Now lift out of the environment you find yourself in and look down on it from above. Lift out further and see the entire neighborhood or area that you are in. Now expand out and lift higher and higher into space. From space, view the Earth as a single luminous blue mandala. See the Earth from all angles. See it as a planetary orb, a wheel spinning in space with an essential value, its dharma or truth, its capacity to sustain life.

Visualize the whole of life on Earth, from the animals, to the plants, to the humans down to the insects and plankton. See it all as one whole system. The whole of the life on the Earth is the biosphere, or the sphere of life that covers the surface of the Earth like a film or vibrant mantle that is ever in motion. Really visualize how all of the different life forms and processes are one unity on this shining blue orb. Now let your mind penetrate beneath the surface of the Earth. Feel the spherical layers of sediment and crystalline rock. Go to the core and find the massive iron crystal octahedron. Feel this crystal core as a dynamic radio receiver elongated in the direction of each of its magnetic poles. Place yourself in meditation at the very center of that crystal radio receiver.
